Things My Mother Taught Me: Finding Forgiveness

RABBI'S MESSAGE

As some of you may already know, for most of my youth my mother Barbara Davidson was a TV columnist for Newsday, and then a reporter and columnist for the New York Times.

One of my early childhood memories is of her reviewing the network coverage of the 1964 Presidential elections—in those days it was just ABC, CBS, NBC, and PBS. I remember four televisions set up in the living room, as she watched, listened, and reviewed the experts.

Then, as now, my mother thought that most of TV was a wasteland (in one unforgiveable column she blasted "Star Trek"!); as a result, my TV watching was severely curtailed. Leonard Bernstein's "Young People's Concerts," the science show "What's New," and "Batman," (in which the violence was so silly that you knew it wasn't real) were among the handful of shows that passed the Barbara-test. The fact that I watched so little and read so much may in fact explain why I am such a nerd.

Although I don't think she did me irreparable harm not watching the same things as the rest of my generation, there are numerous cultural connections that I still miss.

I was too old for "Sesame Street." It was another show she didn't like, as she was convinced that children were being trained to watch for commercials (even if the commercials were in fact advertising letters). In hindsight, how many of us watch TV trained to sit for 8 minutes, and then take a mental or potty break?

And yet despite her best efforts, somehow I learned the Mickey Mouse Song. I don't think I ever saw the show, but I went around the house singing "M-I-C"... "K-E-Y" (Y? Because we love you!)... "M-O-U -S-E." To this day, it is one of those annoying tunes that a pops into my head, and you should all be grateful that I don't burst into song when it does.

I realized over 40 years ago that this soundtrack plays regularly around the

High Holy Days. I hear "F-O-R"..."G- cannot be forgiven, and that, I believe, is I-V"..."E-N-E-S-S" over and over in my daily mental playlist at this time of the year. Y? Because asking for and offering forgiveness is the concept that is repeated over and over as we approach and then experience these Days of Awe. Even during my angry, "organized-religion-is-a-waste-of-time" teen years, my subconscious must have picked this up and, as a result, translated it into this annoying, repetitive jingle.

My unconscious wasn't wrong. As the month of Elul begins, and as the pace picks up with Selichot, we are instructed, over and over, that we need to make it right with those human beings we may have injured, or else we won't be able to ask God for forgiveness on Yom Kippur. Do we have to ask?

Yes, and I know that I am not alone, when by call, note, or even e-mail, I ask those whom I know I have wronged to forgive me.

Do we have to forgive? Our tradition says yes, though I know that this is sometimes harder than asking. I can imagine that there are offenses that

ultimately left to the individual and God. You may find it funny, as I occasionally do, that I have in fact become part of the organized religious world against which my teenager rebelled.

This too, I credit to my mother. I must have been about 11 or 12, and I remember asking her "What is a sin?" That long list of adult behaviors didn't mean much to me. Her answer has stuck with me to this day. My mother said "A sin is complaining about something without trying to fix that something," and that has guided me through life.

I couldn't complain about organized religion unless I was willling to try and My Fellow Congregants, fix what I perceived to be the flaws. This is the short reason for why I do what I do. And although our Yom Kippur service provides us with an alphabetical list of sins, her definition continues to speak to me.



This year, if you hear that tune wafting down the halls, or from the Bimah, you will know where my thoughts are. And I hope you will join me, not necessarily in singing, but in asking for the forgiveness each of us needs.

If I have offended anyone in the TAY family, I hope you are able to forgive me. If you have offended me, know that you are forgiven.

I hope and pray for a Happy, Healthy, Prosperous and Peaceful New Year for all.

I hope that everyone's summer has been more relaxing than the school year, and therefore rejuvenating. I'm near to ending my summer of Arts & Crafts Director at Camp Young Judaea in Amherst, where I keep track of many moving parts, but most specially have the opportunity to continue my

Over the summer I've been preparing to get our next school year up and going. Although the calendar will be sent out soon, I invite everyone to a **September 24 Family Education Program** about food insecurity, during which we will focus on some Jewish texts about food and how we feed those who are less fortunate than ourselves and during which we will cook a meal for the Nashua Soup Kitchen which they are very excited to receive.

On that Sunday, September 24, we will begin promptly at 9:30 rather than our usual time of 10:00, and anyone who can stay longer than 12:00 noon for finishing up and clean up, is encouraged to do so.

Also, beginning directly after Labor Day, we are beginning our **Seeing the**

World Through Jewish Eyes contest. I've always said that I see the world thorough Jewish eyes—now especially true with my newer glasses that have 12 tiny silver Jewish stars inlaid into the black plastic.

Please notice the Jewish world around you and take pictures of what you see.

There is more than one category of noticing the Jewish around us.

- **1.** While out in the world noticing something that is actually Jewish in some way. Examples:
- the pomegranate that's on the side of the grocery pick-up cabinet at Whole Foods. When Whole Foods designed the cabinet, I'm 97% sure that it was not considering Jewish symbolism when they chose a pomegranate as



one of the pieces of produce to be emblazoned on the cabinet. But there it is!

Pomegranates get much airplay in Jewish life and texts.

- (b) The San Antonio Spurs basketball team's logo naturally incorporates a spur. When I look at the spur (see picture), I immediately see a Jewish star.
- **2.** The serendipity: while I was driving in downtown Nashua last month, there was a car in front of me (see picture) with a license plate reading "LABRIS." Who knows if this is a surname or a word important to the driver, but to me it reads "La Bris"—"the bris." That ceremony is definitely Jewish.

Who can participate in our Seeing the World Through Jewish Eyes contest? Students, of course, but also grandparents, parents, teachers and congregants. The more pictures we have to share, the better. All of our

Religious Response to Hunger Food Drive: Your Yom Kippur Fast Can Aid the Hungry

At a time when the need is high and pantry shelves are running low, New Horizon relies on the community's donations to help put food on the table for thousands of people without the security of knowing where their next meal will come from.

Our Religious Response to Hunger will begin on Rosh Hashanah, when grocery bags will be distributed after services by members of MANTY—who will also reach out to those who cannot attend.

You are asked to take the bags home, fill them with the equivalent of non-perishable food you and your family would have eaten during the High Holy Day. Add a little extra if you can, and then return the bags to the Temple on Yom Kippur.

The bags will then be taken to New Horizons, which in past years has received more than 25 thousand pounds of donated food from our members.

Our Religious Response to Hunger calls on all of us to give more for the growing number of people who need more. There could be no better way to start the New Year than the mitzvah of giving.

We have all experienced what it is like being hungry...the physiological sensation caused by a lack of food. But for 49 million Americans, including 1 in 5 children, "hunger" has been redefined to a more telling epidemic: "Food Insecurity," the inability to access food consistently, whether it be not being able to afford it or not having access to it.

The problem goes far beyond the homeless population and has embedded itself in communities like ours, where parents have to choose between paying their utility bill or buying food. Or adults may go without food so their children can eat.

And for a growing number of seniors the problem poses a different set of challenges: many have the money to purchase food, but do not have the

resources to access or prepare it.

These are the people who find help at the New Horizons Food Pantry and Soup Kitchen.

For over 30 years, Temple Adath Yeshurun, Temple Israel and New Hampshire's religious community have made it a High Holy Day tradition to help those in need with its Religious Response to Hunger.

High Holy Day Ticket Policy 2017

To ensure the financial stability of our three (3) weeks in advance of Temple, and to provide adequate security, we have the following High Holy Day policy in place:

High Holy Day tickets are provided to TAY Members in good standing. "Good Standing" means all forms have been returned to TAY, a payment plan is in place, and arrangements for abatement, if necessary, have been made, and your account is current.

We do not sell tickets to people living locally who are not members of

Members in good standing have the following High Holy Day privileges at **PERMITTED:**

- Attending and participating in all High Holy Day Services at TAY.
- Purchasing Guest Tickets for outof-town family/friends (Members in good standing may purchase tickets for friends and relatives who reside 35 miles or more away from TAY);
- Bringing Adult Children 29 years old and younger
- Receiving reciprocity at another URJ Temple; (All requests must be made to each Temple in a timely manner.)
- **Bringing Complimentary Guests** who are members in good standing at another Synagogue of any dnomination.

Documentation must be received

Erev Rosh HasShannah: that is, by August 30, 2017.

Pricing of Guest Tickets:

Price for one ticket is \$100.00 for one Holiday (Rosh HaShannah OR Yom Kippur); OR \$180 for both.

NOT PERMITTED:

—Individual Members buying tickets for non-affiliated family members of household.

—Individual Members buying HH Tickets for non-Jewish Spouses.

Non-Affiliated out-of-towners purchasing tickets:

Complimentary tickets will be provided to college students or campaign workers.

However, if a parent of a student or campaign worker wants to attend with their student, they can purchase a ticket provided they are not living locally (documentation must be provided 3 weeks before Erev Rosh HaShannah—that is, by August 30, 2017.

People thinking of joining **Temple Adath Yeshurun:**

Complimentary tickets will be sent along with a letter stating this is a one-time opportunity.

When you first check in at the door, you may take a plastic name tag holder for use during the High Holidays.

Please keep your name tag in the holder and bring it to all High Holy Day Services.

After the holidays, we ask that you please return the name tag holders, so that we may reuse, recycle, and save a little money.

Memorial Plaques at Temple Adath Yeshurun

Remembrance is a central part of Jewish culture and heritage. Our holidays signify remembrance of events or identify times of year. So, too, we remember our loved ones at the times of their passing.

In fact, the word "Yahrtzeit" is a conjunction of the Yiddish words for "year" and "time". The Yahrtzeit of an individual has taken on significance in Yizkor (Remembrance) Services, held at TAY on Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Passover, and Shavuot. We remember our loved ones by reading their names on the Shabbat closest to each yahrtzeit. We hold a communal Service of Remembrance at the cemetery on the Sunday between Rosh HaShannah and Yom Kippur (Sunday, Sept. 24, 21017, 10 AM). On Memorial Day, we hold a Remembrance service in our cemetery, for those who served in our military.

Our temple provides another means to remember our loved ones: a Memorial plaque on the wall in the lobby containing the name and date of passing. The tradition of a Yahrtzeit wall dates back centuries.

Our Yahrtzeit wall is modest by comparison with some synagogues, but no less important. The plaques are changed corresponding to the month by our administrator, Karen Rothstein. Should you wish to include the name of your loved one in this Temple Adath Yeshurun tradition, please contact Karen in the office. The cost of a plaque is a one-time fee of \$300.



Our first Sisterhood Meeting will be on Tuesday, Sept. 5 when we will have more specifics about our upcoming calendar. We look forward to another year


