Teshuva: Sounding the Shofar by Barbara Davidson

After Steve Rothstein, TAY's "Shofar Extraordinaire," appeared at the Rosh HaShannah service in October, 2008, a toddler approached Rabbi Beth with a serious comment.

"God is very loud!" the youngster told the Rabbi.

Momentarily taken back, the rabbi told the child that God was loud "to make sure that everyone heard and listened."

Steve, a modest man who takes his considerable prowess in casual stride, admits that his shofar blowing is loud, probably heard, and perhaps even listened to. But he doesn't claim to pinchhit for God. He blows that horn because he can. But he adds, "I put my heart and soul into it."

Sounding the yard-long sheep horn and sustaining the individual notes for minutes at a time are more than a mere musical exercise.

Truly, family is what this congregation is! I have to tell you that one of my proudest moments as the rabbi of TAY took place this past Spring.


A member of our congregation passed away, and he didn't leave folks to remember him at his funeral. But the TAY family stepped up and in, and came to his service.

"I don't practice all year long," Steve said, "but a month before the holidays I take the shofar out, clean it up and start practicing. The important thing is to get my lip and my breath ready, to be as good as I can be."

Steve's skill with the shofar didn't develop as a result of a childhood dream. Born and reared in Cranston, R.I., Steve played the clarinet and drums at school. But when he was 17, his father passed away. The rabbi at Temple Sinai in Cranston—their congregation—asked Steve to sound the shofar that holiday season, as a tribute to his Dad. Steve did, became fascinated by the experience and, of course, the rest is history.

By the time Rothstein graduated from the Ohio College of Podiatric Medicine and he and his wife Karen [now our TAY Office Manager] moved to Manchester in 1982, Steve had proved to himself and his listeners "that I could do it."

His services were not immediately needed at TAY because Rabbi Arthur Starr handled the sounding of the shofar; Starr's successor, Rabbi Barbara Borts, did call upon Steve occasionally. When Rabbi Beth Davidson appeared on the scene and heard Steve's sound, she gave him the gig—and the title "Shofar Extraordinaire."

This will be Steve Rothstein's eleventh year sounding the shofar at TAY. As Rabbi Beth reflected on teshuvah and Maimonides in August, Steve was practicing "to be as good as I can be."

"It has more meaning," he says. "Having my heart and soul engaged is more important than just sounding that horn."

A New Look for the New Year: Rejuvenation for 5776

Temple Adath Yeshurun is undergoing rejuvenation of its site as a home for Jewish prayer, study and social gathering.

The present building was heralded as an architectural masterpiece when it was constructed over 50 years ago, but time has taken its toll on infrastructure.

We knew it was time for changes to be made inside as well as outside the building. Many of the seats in the of repair, a very expensive proposition.

After study and review, it was decided to remove the pews and replace them with comfortable chairs which can be linked together in either straight lines or in a semi-circular pattern. These chairs have a book-rack underneath for copies of the Torah and a small pocket for the service folder.

The old pews have been donated to the

Founder's Charter School in Manchester for use in their assembly hall.

The TAY bimah will be expanded with handicapped ramp access created. New indoor LED lighting is planned for the sanctuary and the wall dividing the sanctuary and social hall will be replaced with a moveable one. A plan is also underway to redesign the lobby and entrance area.

Changes are also being made, both inside and

out, to accommodate the JFNH Preschool Program of the Federation, previously housed in the former Federation building across the street. Improved lighting is being installed in the back of the building on Harrison Street. A playground will be constructed on the Harrison Street side.

It is hoped that these changes will give TAY the flexibility to allow not only for more intimate prayer space for worship when needed, but also for increased space for programs when needed:

for TAY's Religious School; for the JFNH Preschool; for temple events such as holiday celebrations, educational programs, concerts and plays; for Sisterhood, Brotherhood, and Seniors Forever Young—three groups that benefit not only TAY, but often the Jewish and non-Jewish communities, as well.

Principal's Message Stephen Dolman

5776: A Year of Change

As we begin to make preparations for the high holidays and the New Year, the Temple Adath Yeshurun Religious School is doing the same. It will be a year of both stability and change.

The first major change is one of a physical nature. We will be sharing our space with the Greater Manchester Jewish Preschool which was previously located across the street at the former Jewish Federation Building. This sharing of space has led to some changes in our physical structure and the usage of our school facility. Starrs Cruise the World for 50th Anniversary

Rabbi Arthur Starr—Rabbi Emeritus—Writes Letter to Congregation

My dear friends,

then.

How many times did I begin an article or a sermon to you with those words over the thirty-one years I was privileged to be your rabbi in Manchester. Where have the years gone? I arrived in Manchester in 1971, at the young age of 29 years old. I retired in 2002. Let me fill you in on what we have done since

We went to St. Thomas, U.S. Virgin Islands, in 2002 to be the rabbi of the historic St. Thomas Synagogue. It is a small, but very active congregation and I was the rabbi there for a little more than six years. When I retired, Linda and I began going on cruises as the rabbi on-board, and we found that we loved it. We did a few two-week cruises for Chanukah and Passover, a thirty-day cruise for the High Holydays around Australia.

I was then asked to take an eight-week cruise to the Mediterranean which we did for three years; also one around South America and Antarctica, and to the South Pacific and Asia.

This year we were thrilled to be invited to take a four month cruise around the world. It was a perfect start to our 50th anniversary celebration!

Two years ago we moved from St Thomas to Florida, so our kids would have an easier time coming to us. We spend the summers in the Berkshires of Massachusetts, and they all visit us here.

Our three daughters, all of whom grew up and were married at TAY, have beautiful families and are very involved in their own Jewish communities. We visit them during the year in Pennsylvania and North Carolina. Our six grandchildren are growing up. Our

oldest granddaughter celebrated her Bat Mitzvah two years ago and our oldest grandson will become Bar Mitzvah in October.

We have also led seven missions to Cuba over the last ten years to aid the Jewish community there. It has been a very fulfilling mitzvah. We are hopeful about the new relationship that has begun between the US and Cuba.

We feel we have been blessed with good health and great opportunities and are grateful for all we have, including the wonderful years we spent in Manchester. We have stayed in touch with many of you over the last thirteen years, which has helped keep alive those precious memories.

Religious Response for Hunger 5776

August 18, 2015. This is the year Temple Adath Yeshurun and Temple Israel hope to pour our hearts out for the Religious Response for Hunger.

When was the last time you said "I am hungry," and you had nowhere to go to get food? Many people go to bed hungry and wake up the next day hungry, wondering where they will get something to eat. How do we feel when we pass someone holding a sign that says "feed me"? Our actions can help make a difference for those people.

The New Horizons Soup Kitchen counts on us every year during the High Holy Days—along with churches in the Greater Manchester area-to collect nonperishable food staples to help restock the shelves at the Soup Kitchen. In addition to providing meals, the organization distributes food to the needy.

For over 35 years Temple Adath Yeshurun has made the commitment to make this collection drive of non-perishable food item a tremendous success. Our generosity comes at a time when the Soup Kitchen is preparing to meet the cold weather needs of the many hungry people who depend on this aid.

MANTY will distribute plastic bags after Rosh HaShannah services September 14 and 15 to take home to fill with the equivalent food you might have eaten during your Yom Kippur fast. Then add a little more so we surpass all other past years.

This year a new step has been added to help increase the amount of food for the Soup Kitchen. Rabbi Beth Davidson, Charlie Sherman from New Horizons, Mayor Ted Gatsas, and Judith Jolton have been working to insure that we designate September as "Hunger Action Month." Many businesses have been contacted and are more than willing to place large boxes in their places of business for food to be collected.
