## **Responding in These Challenging Times**

From the Rabbi: Beth D. Davidson

As the rabbi of Temple Adath Yeshurun, it is my honor to be the teacher, preacher, and counselor for our congregation. As I see it, my primary job is to share what Judaism and our tradition have to say on any given topic, and the world in which we live. As you can imagine, this can be a challenge: as is the case with any group of Jews, we have various perspectives and numerous opinions represented in our community. I want to educate, not offend.

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Politics can be a particularly sticky arena. While I am sure that I feel as passionately as others do, I tend to avoid speaking about the political; while I will remind you on the Shabbat immediately preceding Election Day to go vote, I will never endorse a particular candidate from the Bimah. That is not the rabbi's job, as I see it.

If you talk to me for more than five minutes, you can probably guess where I stand on most issues, but as I said after the recent election, and as I genuinely believe, at this point it doesn't matter for whom you voted. Whether we are Democrats or Republicans or Libertarians or Socialists, whether we see the world through liberal or conservative lenses, whether we were happy or sad about the recent election,

Dear Congregants, I want to wish you all Happy Spring. The days are getting longer and I for one will be happy to say goodbye to winter. Don't get me wrong, I love winter, but I am getting tired

of putting on my coat, hats and gloves every time I go outside. Time to stop hibernating.

For those of us who love to exercise with our families and pets (or just want the fun and pleasure of watching others have a good time in their craziness), Bagels & Biscuits 5k Race will be held on April 9, 2017, at Derryfield Park in Manchester.

we need to learn how to work together.

Working together is not, and will not be easy, but our tradition insists that we roll up our sleeves and engage in the process, according others the respect we expect for ourselves. You have, I think, to give respect if you want to receive respect.

Having given this lengthy disclaimer, I think that people sometimes like to hear their rabbi's opinion, especially when it comes to an area where the rabbi is supposed to be an expert. So I haven't been surprised that over the last few months, as antiSemitic incidents have been frequent and public, that a number of people have asked me if I think that President Trump is an antiSemite.

They ask, I think, for a number of reasons. It may be because of the connections between some in the Administration and the Alt-Right. It may be because of the Administration's decision to initially downplay the connection between Jewish victims of the Holocaust and International Holocaust Remembrance Day, giving antiSemites tacit permission to revision the Shoah. And it may be because of the current discussion about eliminating a State Department position dedicated to monitoring and combating global anti-Semitism would enable the growth of antiSemitism abroad.

My answer to the question of President Trump's beliefs is "No." I genuinely believe that the President loves his Jewish daughter, son-in-law, and grandchildren. And while the President and I would disagree on his choice of Ambassadors to Israel, or on our vision for a safe and secure Israel, I think he is committed to maintaining a positive US-Israel relationship. I do not think that President Trump is an antiSemite.

Whatever you may think about our President on this issue, I do believe, however, that we have cause for concern when we look at society at large. Why have anti-Semites here at home been emboldened to come out of the dark and in from the

fringes of society, empowered to spew their hatred in the light of day?



I believe the vitriolic tone towards and denigration of one's opponents in the recent campaign cycle have made incivility acceptable, and

given once-marginalized ideas higher profile and a veneer of acceptability.

I believe the current wave of populism is moving us closer to outright xenophobia. The climate in our United States is in fact not united, but more divided than ever.

When Americans think and speak about "us" versus "them," folks who are different become the victims of prejudice. We Jews have historically been the focus of those who preach exclusion, not inclusion; and while we aren't the only targets in the current clime, we certainly have been targeted

I am concerned, as I suspect are many of you, that the wave of bomb threats to Jewish institutions—124 of them at the time that I write this—and the desecrations of 3 Jewish cemeteries in recent weeks, are only the beginning. New York City police have already reported a disconcerting rise in the number of antiSemitic hate crimes, and though we in New Hampshire have not yet experienced such a surge, it may simply be a matter of time.

Thomas Jefferson was correct when he said, "Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty." We must be alert, and should we experience overt or covert acts of antiSemitism, we have to be ready to respond appropriately.

I will have more to say about this next month, but the short answer is that we may have to be prepared to go to the authorities, write a letter to a local paper, or let those standing around the water cooler know that so called "ethnic humor" isn't funny. It is hateful and hurtful. We will need to be willing to speak up and speak out, if and when it is necessary. We need to overpower the voices of those who preach hate and fear.

## Ryan Rosenberg Receives the Ner Tamid Scouting Award at TAY

On Friday evening, March 17, Ryan Rosenberg and his parents were called to the bimah at Shabbat service so that he could receive the Ner Tamid Scouting award.

Past President Alan Kaplan presented the award as well as giving background and historical context.

The Boy Scouts Association (in England) was founded in 1910, and the Boy Scouts of America was formed the same year. There has been Jewish involvement in scouting almost since its inception, but the Ner Tamid emblem for Scouts between ages 11 and 14, has only been a part of the BSA since 1945.

Kaplan noted: "The Ner Tamid emblem is a pendant representing the Eternal Light that hangs in front of the Holy Ark in the Synagogue. It is attached to a blue and white ribbon, and a bronze bar pin that carries the inscription 'Ner Tamid' in Hebrew letters and 'Eternal Light' in English.

"The Ner Tamid in the synagogue of our own day goes the hon back to the seven-branched menorah described in the Bible in Exodus. The center light, from which the other six were kindled, is the Ner Tamid. The lamp burned continually, symbolizing the Jewish people's eternal devotion to God's teachings."

Kaplan also explained the specific activities that Ryan had to complete to earn the award: "The Ner Tamid requires the completion of several activities in the areas of Home Observance, Synagogue Worship and Prayer, support of the American Jewish Community, knowledge about American Jews and American Jewish Organizations, and performing three service projects for the synagogue, Scout unit, and the Jewish community at large."

Ryan has done all of these things. Congratulations, Ryan from everyone at Temple Adath Yeshurun.



# Temple Adath Yeshurun's Trust Funds: To Which Funds Should I Give?

The Trust Committee at Temple Adath Yeshurun is responsible for preserving and managing the assets of the trust. The Trust receives contributions and transfers, and makes allocations and distributions based upon the enabling agreements of the trust and its specific funds. The Trust funds consist of gifts, endowments, and income earned and retained by the investments. At fiscal year end June 2016, the total value of the funds held by the Temple Trust was \$1,789,226.

The objectives for the trust assets are to preserve the endowment while providing a predictable and consistent stream of funding to the temple. The amount of money available from the trust each year is based on the net income from the trust investments earned in the prior year.

There are five different types of accounts in the Trust: General Endowment, Managed Funds, Restricted Funds, Nsmed Funds, and Special Purpose Funds.

#### **General Endowment:**

Ninety per cent (90%) of the earnings from this fund is used to support the general annual operating budget of the Temple.

#### **Managed Funds:**

These are funds that are held and managed by the Trust, but are not subject to the indentures of the trust, and are available at the request of the Temple Board of Directors.

- 1. Board Discretionary Fund: Normally funded by budget surpluses to be used as a rainy day fund.
- 2. Building Fund: Funded by assessments on new members, and through contributions.
- 3. Holocaust Memorial: Supports maintenance of the Holocaust memorial.
- 4. Torah Fund: Supports maintenance, preservation and safekeeping of our torahs.

# Who Serves on the Temple Trust? On What Terms?

The Committee consists of seven members, six of whom serve a staggered three-year term confirmed by the Temple Board of Directors. The seventh committee member is the current presiding President of the Temple. Current members and their terms are as follows:

2017 Term: Bennett Freeman & David Penchansky

2018 Term: Joel Gordon & Marty Wolff 2019 Term: Debra Feins & Jay Hodes Current presiding President: Cate Tanzer.

#### **Restricted Funds:**

These funds were established to support a specific function within the temple that was important to the fund's benefactor. There are now 16 such funds. Generally, 90% of the earnings of these funds are used to support a specific program or function of the temple. Contributing to these funds is a great way not only to honor the fund benefactor, but to support programming within the temple that is of particular interest to the donor.

- 1. Marilyn and Milton Corwin Scholarship Fund—provides tuition support for needy students in the Temple's Religious School.
- 2. Steven Goldstein Youth Leadership Scholarship Fund—supports youth leadership programs in the Temple, including MANTY.
- 3. Debbie and Murray Grant Adult Education Fund—supports adult education programming within the Temple.
- 4. Mitchell & Sophie Muskat Fund—supports camper scholarships to Jewish Summer camps.
- 5. Joseph & Sarah Nightingale Fund—provides a book or award to the "outstanding" confirmation student.
- 6. Lou Smith Memorial Series—provides seed money for educational programming at the temple.
- 7. TAY Religious School Fund—supports the Temple Religious School within the TAY budget.
- 8. Martin & Diane Trust Building Maintenance Fund—supports maintenance requirements of the building within the Temple budget.
- 9. Sarah & William Zelinsky Holocaust Education Fund—supports Holocaust education programming within the Temple.
- 10. TAY Cemetery Perpetual Care Fund--supports maintenance and operations of the Temple Cemetery within the TAY annual budget.
- 11. Brotherhood Trust Fund—supports the Temple religious school within the TAY annual budget.
- 12. Deeva Rosenzweig Social Action Fund—supports social action programming within the temple community.
- 13. Short Family Youth Fund—promotes the involvement of temple youth in cultural, social and religious activities designed to strengthen Jewish identity and community.
- 14. Etta Berman Fund--supports the Samuel Sugerman Scholarship Fund.
- 15. Samuel Sugerman Scholarship Fund—supports college level scholarship awarded by Brotherhood.
- 16. Rabbi Starr Interfaith Fund—supports interfaith programming within the temple community as directed by the Brotherhood.

#### **Named Funds:**

These funds were established to honor and recognize those important to our temple family. At present, there are 54 named funds within the trust. Such a fund can be established with an initial contribution of \$1,500, and 90% of the earnings is used to support the general operating budget of the temple. The remaining 10% of earnings is used to increase the value of the General Endowment Fund.

Contributing to these funds is a wonderful way to celebrate a simcha of the named family, or to honor their memory during a yahrtzeit.



A Passover Treat to make at home from URJ:

## Vegan Chocolate Peanut-butter Matzah Squares

by Lisa Dawn Angerame

These make for an amazing Passover treat!

If peanuts don't conform to your Passover *minhag* (custom), try using almond butter in this recipe instead.

#### Ingredients:

- 1 1/4 cup organic natural peanut butter (room temperature)
- i 4 tablespoons Earth Balance (1/2 stick, softened)
- 1 cup vegan powdered sugar
- 1 cup of matzah meal (approx 3 sheets processed)
- 1 cup vegan chocolate chips

#### Directions:

- 1. Sift the powdered sugar.
- 2. In a separate bowl, use a hand mixer to combine 1 cup peanut butter and the Earth Balance. (If too thick for mixer, use your hands).
- 13. Add the powdered sugar in 1/2 a cup at a time. When thoroughly combined, add the matzah meal and 1/2 cup of the chocolate chips. Combine well.
- 4. Lightly grease a 9x9 baking pan, and spoon in the mixture. Press it down firmly so it is even.5.
- 5. Melt together the remaining 1/4 cup peanut butter and the remaining 1/2 cup chocolate chips. Pour it over the top and spread it out evenly. Place in the refrigerator to set (at least an hour).
- 6. Cut into squares and serve.



## Words of Comfort and Renewal in Challenging Times

[Editor's Note: On Friday, March 3, 2013, Rabbi Beth Davidson sent out an email to the congregation in response to events of the previous two weeks. Please take a look at Rabbi Beth's words as well as those of Rabbi Anna Boswell-Levi who visited the cemetery in Philadelphia after it was vandalized and wrote movingly about her experience. We are reprinting it here for those who may have missed. See also Rabbi Beth's Message for March, "Responding in These Challenging Times," on pages 1 and 2 of this issue.]

Dear Members of the TAY Community,

In the last two weeks, three Jewish cemeteries have been vandalized (St. Louis; Philadelphia; Rochester, NY). Much has been written and said about this frightening wave of anti-Semitism—and whether it is a harbinger of worse things to come. I cannot answer that with any certainty, but like you, I am disturbed and concerned.

What I can do is urge you to report any incidents/graffiti to the proper authorities. Thus far we have been fortunate in the great- We will raise and repair these stones, and this cemetery will er Manchester area. I can also share with you a gem written by a rabbinic colleague in the Philadelphia area.

Rabbi Anna Boswell-Levi has gifted us with words of comfort and challenge, and I hope that you will find the essay below to be both.... ~Rabbi Beth

It was good to go to the Mt. Carmel cemetery today. I needed to be able to see the damage myself. Media reports have been so mixed, some reporting "dozens" of headstones overturned, while Really, they were saying it all along, but today I was there to others reporting over 500 headstones impacted. It is easy to understand the confusion when you go: Mt. Carmel is no longer an active cemetery; the graves are crowded and the ground very uneven. You can see fallen headstones here and there as soon as you enter, but what is not clear is how long they were in that state, or how they came to be that way. Indeed, many had evidently fallen long ago. But as I made my way into the heart of the graveyard, it was stunning to see whole rows of headstones toppled, some in pieces, and some fallen on top of each other. There was no graffiti of any sort that I saw. It was shocking and very sad to witness.

After walking around for a while, speaking with various individuals including some rabbi colleagues, I felt called to sit among the fallen stones engraved with families' names—none of my own family, but names of my people, names of my tribe. Closing my eyes, I felt their peace. In that moment, I actually did not feel that the peace of those who had passed had been interrupted. Rather, the stones seemed to be saying to me: Don't worry about us, this isn't about us! This is about you, your children's future and your community's future! Look beyond this cemetery... but also, do not forget us.

I continued to feel immense sadness, but there was also a sense I got that urged me to open my eyes and look up toward the heav-

ens. The cemetery has no trees, and the gray sky was vast above me. "I lift my eyes up to the hills; from where does my help come? My help comes from the Holy One, Maker of heaven and earth." (Ps. 121) Sitting on the earth, and looking up toward the heavens, I felt reassured and fear left me. I remembered that I was sitting on holy ground.

I went to the Mt Carmel to connect with something beyond my distress and fear, and to find some kind of direction (both, admittedly, for myself and for my congregation). And I surely did—this place, like all cemeteries, is a place that transcends the news of the day or the policies of particular government. I connected with a steadiness and a comfort that one can only find among these quiet monuments, testaments to whole lives. There, I found the courage to ask myself: What is my life? What will be my testament?

look better than ever, that is sure. But let us take this opportunity such adversity presents us with: to reflect on our lives and raise ourselves, our community, and our society anew.

The scourge of antiSemitism is not new, but of late it has come out from the shadows. In recent decades, American Jews have grown comfortable and complacent. Let us also take the moment to step away from that comfort and find a new and awakened voice, borne of the urgency to live our truth. That is the message I got from the headstones today. hear it.


