President's Message Alan D. Kaplan

[Editor's note: President Alan D. Kaplan prepared and delivered this message to the congregation on Rosh Hashanah morning, 5776 (9-14-2015). It is reprinted here.]

Good Morning and L'Shana Tova. Each



year the president is responsible for providing our membership with a report on the "well-being" of our congregation and making an appeal to keep our Temple family and its facilities healthy for the years to come.

This year I had the opportunity to enjoy the beauty of G-d's creation in Northern Maine while writing my report. Away from the city lights, the heavens are filled as G-d promised—with stars too numerous to count, thousands of lakes, beautiful flowers and an abundance of wildlife. I saw livestock grazing the fields; loons, ducks and fish populating the waterways, and a variety of wildlife

bear.

I was reminded of a story that speaks with equal clarity to hiking a trail in the woods or walking down the aisle in the sanctuary. You need to know your prayers and remember the rabbinic teaching that guides us each day and particularly during these Days of Awe: "Be mindful that while we must pray as though everything depends on G-d, we must act as though everything depends upon us."

A Jewish guy is hiking alone in the Great North Woods. Suddenly he comes upon a large bear. The bear spots the guy and raises up to his full 10-foot height. The guy has the major yickes and starts praying: "Ribono shel olam, I got some real tsuris here, I need help, what can I do, what can I do?" The guy glances up at the bear and what do you know? The bear is bowing and shucking, too. The guy thinks: "A Jewish bear! Thank you! Thank you G-d!"

He walks over, hand out, to introduce himself to the bear. Just then, the bear is finishing his prayer: "Chamotzi lechem min ha'aretz. Omein!"

Last year I discussed with you a plan for re-vitalization and re-creation of our worship, study and community gathering. I told you the story of a simple taylor who partnered with G-d to create a successful business—"Lord and Taylor." Our own partnership "Lord and TAY" has enjoyed similar success and the realization of many of our goals.

- 1. While we have lost some members through illness or moving out of the community, new families and individuals have joined the Temple, keeping our numbers stable.
- 2. Income has improved with the elimination of automatic 100% abatements and realistic payment plans for those truly needing assistance. No person is turned away because of need. 100% of our congregants now participate in some way toward the support of our Temple. I want to acknowledge all the hours spent by our treasurer Mike Litvin and assistant treasurer Reva Miller and the members of the abatement committee who keep, the books and have the unenviable task of making collection calls.
- 3. Volunteerism by many Temple members in our school, helping with office and grounds tasks have diminished the need for contracted services. We have a new principal in our Religious School, Steve Dolman—who brings to TAY years of personal teaching experience and management of school affairs. Under his guidance improvements in our curriculum should enhance our educational program and attract more students.
- 4. New income streams have resulted from rental of space to outside organizations and the incorporation of the Jewish Federation preschool into our building. Bringing the preschool to TAY would not have been possible without the uncounted hours of dedication by our negotiating committee: Joel Gordon, Bob Katchen, Lee Hill and Cate Tanzer; and through the supervision of the project by Bob Katchen, David Rosenzweig and Judson Belmont.
- **5.** Savings have been realized through redesign of our personnel and hiring policies.
- **6.** The very successful first year L'Chayim food fair organized by Cate Tanzer will again take place this year on October 18th; the third annual Bagels and Biscuts 5K Road Race is scheduled for

This New Year brings new beginnings, and the renovations in our sanctuary, social hall and patio will continue over the next months. If all goes according to plan, by our next New Year, 5777, our worship and community spaces will be revitalized and refreshed.

Change however, also brings some challenges, and so I hope everyone will be patient as the process unfolds. Once the new carpet goes in, I trust everyone will make an effort not to carry food or drink into the sanctuary; we can show our appreciation for our new and comfortable chairs by not eating or drinking while seated on them. We are going to try and not put "The Great Wall of Manchester" back up, and this will be a bit of an experiment. With a little luck, the new wall system will be in place by the Spring.

If you have already made a gift to the Capital Campaign, thank you for your commitment to our future; if you have not made a pledge or donation to the Capital Campaign, I hope you will consider joining Cliff and myself, the TAY Board, and many of your fellow congregants in supporting a reinvigorated TAY facility.

I am cautiously optimistic that we will be able to address both aesthetic and infrastructure issues, and that next year, when we dedicate our new space, we will have a building that is comfortable, uplifting, warm and welcoming.

April 2016. Chanukah and Purim Parties, Concert by the Boston Music Festival (who have asked to return to TAY next spring), a monthly movie night, a sold out Deli-night, continuing events for seniors and expansion of the Cantorial concert have brought more members of both our community and the outside community into the building than in many previous years.

- **7.** A reduction in the previous \$32,000 yearly dues to the URJ to \$10,000 and complete relief of a \$140,000 debt for old unpaid dues was negotiated.
- **8.** The High Holy Days' appeal last

year was more successful than in the previous year and the number of Chai members—both family and individual—increased. I am hoping even more of you who are financially able will sign on as Chi members. The increased giving truly helps to make up for those less fortunate.

All of theses elements and in particular the individual generosity of many members has resulted in the opportunity to avoid an increase in dues for this year.

Our plans to revitalize the physical plant are moving ahead based on a generous response to the Capital campaign. One hundred per cent of the Board of Directors has participated; we have already received pledges or funds from 25% of the congregation.

While this is a three-year campaign with a minimum goal of \$300,000, we are now able to move ahead with many of the projects planned for the revitalization and free up additional dollars for infrastructure maintenance and repair.

All of you are able to enjoy a comfortable seat this year without having to squeeze between the fixed bays of pew seats. In a few weeks the handicapped accessible ramp to the bimah, the bimah extension to accommodate the choir and our Tefilah band, new areaspecific LED lighting for the sanctuary and social hall, and new carpet in the sanctuary, foyer and library will be installed.

Later this year the wall that separates the social hall from the sanctuary will be replaced with a folding wall that will allow use of the entire hall for either social or secular functions. The new folding wall will take minutes to deploy or retract, instead of two days.

I recently met with our architect who is designing the new lobby and patio areas. The outside patio work is slated to begin next spring and will be funded by a special grant left by Robert Stahl.

We all have the opportunity to make a difference. While we can pray to G-d for guidance, in the end our actions and success depend on us.

Consider the case of Joseph, a deeply religious man, who went to temple one day during the Holy Days and forgot his prayer shawl, so he borrowed one from the rack at the temple. At the end of the service, he realized that he really liked this tallit, so much so that he actually decided to stuff it down the front can defer or even do without one non-

The Rabbi, exasperated, said, "Joseph ... you took the Shofar, too?"



As I write this Principal's Message for October, our TAY community has just finished celebrating our High Holy Days. We are in the midst of our celebration of the fall festival of Sukkot.

On Sunday October 4, we celebrated the holiday of Simchat Torah and the consecration of our first graders. Many of you were there to help us honor our Torah and our first graders. [Editor's Note: See picture on page 1 and on these pages.]



The beginning of the School year is usually spent assessing to see what knowledge has been retained and what needs to be reviewed. For example, in 2nd

grade the students are reviewing their Alaph Bets and vowel sounds with their teacher. The students in 7th grade are working to learn the reading of the prayer "Elu Devarim" and how it has an effect on their everyday life.

Teachers are going over class rules and expectations for both behavior and school work. This is a time for both teachers and students to get to know each other and start to develop their relationship.

In Judaica, the classes have been learning about the Holy Days. In the 5th and 6th grade they are going to be learning about the concept of community—what it

means, and the responsibility of belonging to one. The students will also make a time capsule expressing their feelings and their expectations for what they think they will learn.

time Manchester resident Doris Chirug Schrader. Doris ran the school until her retirement in 1972, and the school continued to flourish until closing its doors in 1983.

Recognizing the role of a Jewish preschool and its importance to the NH Jewish community, current JFNH Preschool Director Alane Sabel and a group of young families reestablished the school in 1987. Alane was the lead teacher and director, and with one assistant teacher and 15 three- and four-year-olds in a mixeddays per week.

ed strong leadership as the JFNH Preschool Director, and through the years, she has taught every age group from two year olds through kindergarten, while ing taught. Today, the school is open five days a week and offers extended hours running from 7:30 AM for early drop-off until 5 PM for extended care.

The NH Jewish community has had a long All of the teachers at the JFNH Preschool have extensive teaching experience, and each has a history of longevity in teaching at the school, with the average length of time teaching at the JFNH Preschool being greater than nine years. The staff are

also active members of the Jewish community, and they are not only teaching preschool, but also Sunday school and Hebrew school at local synagogues.

Families that have made up the JFNH Preschool community have come from Nashua, Amherst, Bedford, Merrimack, Londonderry, Derry, Hooksett, Concord, Bow, and other areas throughout the state, and most of the children who have come to the school have also gone on to continue their Jewish education in their respective communities where there are active congregations.

Rabbis from local congregations come to participate in JFNH Preschool activities as well. The Shabbat celebration is one area in particular where the rabbis enjoy spending time with the children. And hopefully, if the shlicha (Israeli emissary) program is able to resume, the shlicha will take an active role in the preschool once again.

The new home of the JFNH Preschool is within Temple Adath Yeshurun. . . across the street from its former location. At the time of this writing, the



Start with ¾ cup of this anytime treat, sprinkle with ¼ c. of granola, and you've got breakfast with staying power that will keep you going.

Dr. Mary's Pumpkin Yogurt

1 qt. Stonyfield Non-fat French Vanilla yogurt (If you prefer Greek yogurt or a plain version, you can add 1 tsp. vanilla to the quart.)

1 can pumpkin

1 tsp. ground cinnamon

½ tsp. ground ginger

1/4 tsp. ground cloves

½ tsp. nutmeg

Sweetener to taste:

8-10 pkts. Artificial sweetener of your choice

OR you can stir in 1/4 c. of honey

OR you can stir a teaspoon of sugar, honey, maple syrup, or any sweetener into your individual serving,

1 serving = $\frac{3}{4}$ cup = $\frac{1}{2}$ c. yogurt +1/4 c. pumpkin.)

Simply mix all ingredients thoroughly in a bowl, and store in 2 saved yogurt containers, or use portion-sized containers.
